Hello Neighbors!

The Town of Hartford has had a very busy and somewhat chaotic last three months.

Our Town Office finally moved back into the newly repaired (and refurbished) Town Office Building. A big thanks to Lianne and Steve for moving the office equipment and files to and from the 2 buildings and working in the temporary office-community hall for weeks. We all appreciate your hard work!! Barbara's too.

We hope everyone takes the opportunity to see the remodel. Steve and his team did a good job with the office repairs.

The Town Office and "Community" Hall buildings got grant approval for new heat pumps, which were installed in early December (and working great). They will help keep the buildings warm in the winter and COOL in the summer. It will be so great to have air conditioning available for community events, meetings and hall rentals.

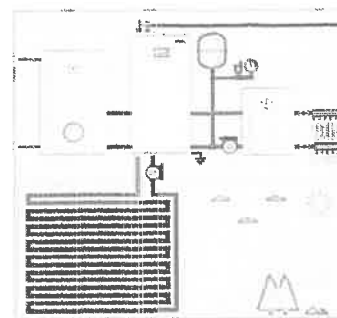
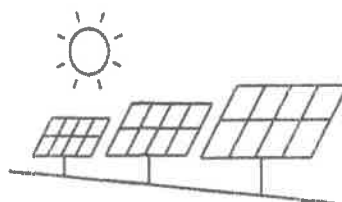
As a part of that energy efficiency grant, we also were approved for 20 solar panels for the Community Hall. These should be fully installed by the time this newsletter comes out.

The solar panels will produce electricity that will go into the power grid and the Town of Hartford will receive "credits" on their electricity bill for that power the panels are producing. Our goal is to add warmth and cooling while reducing our power costs.

The holiday season brought back to back to back storms to Maine. All of Hartford lost power for days before Christmas. Many members of our community helped their neighbors with clearing tree debris, diverting water, shoveling snow, making meals and providing overnight stays. The Town Hall was open with volunteers ready to feed folks and provide a warm place to visit and charge phones. It was such a wonderful feeling to hear of all the *neighbors helping neighbors*. We also want to mention all the long hours our road crew and Road Commissioner have been putting in to keep our roads clear and safe.

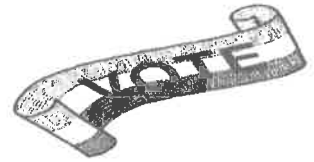

The school offers **Extended Learning Opportunities** that are hands-on, credit-bearing courses outside the traditional classroom that emphasize community-based career exploration. They are highly personalized opportunities for students to engage in learning in ways that make sense to them & that connect their learning to daily life in meaningful ways. **ELOs** are a unique mix of academic instruction & assignments that combine experiential learning components like project-based learning, job-shadows, internships, and work-study.

**If you have an idea for supporting an ELO, are interested and willing to work with high school students as they explore careers, and would like to help us prepare our students for a future in Maine, please let us know!**

For example, 3 seniors are currently taking a Fire-fighting/EMS course at the Buckfield Fire Station. Once a week, they meet at the facility & make their way through a hands-on curriculum. They just started the course trimester 2 and one student has already registered for an upcoming 12-week course that will certify her as a 'basic' EMT. Another is currently volunteering as a firefighter and expects to continue his training. I'm so proud of them!

Students in another ELO are focused on Athletic Training. They're taking an Honors Anatomy & Physiology course taught by a community member who is a former physical therapist and teacher. Concurrently, they're participating in a Career Exploration course through JMG, Jobs for Maine Graduates, and are working with our BJSHS Athletic Trainer at all practices and games throughout the school year. In addition to academic internships & work-study opportunities, job shadows are also being arranged for 9th & 10th graders that last several hours, an entire day, or the course of several days. Students explore a career of interest through a short-term, onsite experience hosted by a community member/business.

In another type of ELO, nearly ten juniors & seniors are earning elective credit as they work in a variety of occupations. To elevate their 'work' experience to a 'learning' experience, they complete a biweekly reflection focused on the skills & behaviors they are learning & improving on the job, both personally & professionally. They routinely consider what they are learning about themselves as Maine employees, & are evaluated by their direct supervisors using Maine's Guiding Principles and Career Prep Standards. T

To engage middle school students in career exploration, students participate in 30-minute presentations every other Friday. Community members present their careers; they explain their academic and career pathways, illustrate what a day in their life looks like, and share the responsibilities, rewards, and possible frustrations of the job. Presentations end with follow-up questions and conclude with student feedback. We're booked through March, but over two years hope to provide a wide range of possibilities.

**I'm proud to report** that our ELO program presently engages 48 students in a variety of Extended Learning Opportunities that are supported by a wide variety of community-minded professionals. They include but are not limited to, a game warden, child psychologist, race-car fabricator, teacher, dental hygienist, and nurse. We are incredibly fortunate to have their support in terms of time and effort, are excited by the prospects, and feel genuinely thankful.

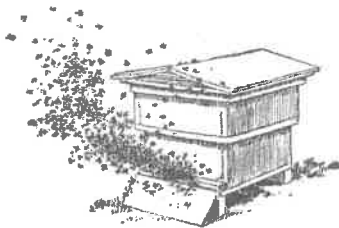

This is a quiet time of year at the J & O Irish Museum. When spring arrives, we need to get our ramp replaced and would like to get some painting done inside the building. Our first function will be our Annual Plant Sale on May 11<sup>th</sup>, the day before Mother's Day. Sending out a Thank you to all who help make this sale so great. Thank you to all the gardeners that donate plants. Thank you to all that donate items for our raffle table, and thank you to everyone that helps with set up and take down. A great big THANK YOU to everyone that comes, purchases the plants and takes chances on the raffle items.

Our second fund raiser is a Yard Sale which we hold usually during the month of June. The store was built in 1867 by two brothers, James & Orlando Irish. Many people depended on this local store, for groceries, kerosene, grain and many other supplies. It also housed the post office. It closed in the 1950's and was given to the Hartford Heritage Society in 1976, by James Irish, the son of the original James who built the store. We love donations that fit into that time period. ## ROARING 20'S PARTY

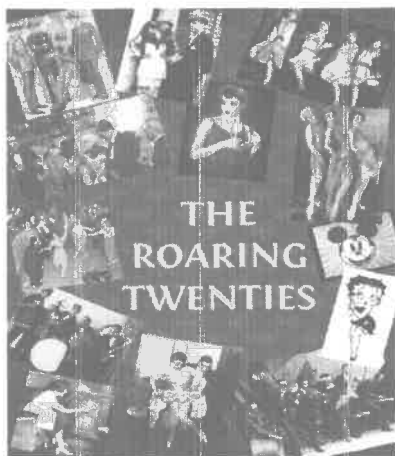
FEBRUARY 17, 2024 6-10 PM

## HARTFORD SUMNER FOOD BANK

The food bank has continued to grow each month with 2 or 3 new customers signing up, on average. This is great as we would rather have people utilize the food bank and use their cash for other necessities.

Because of space constraints, we usually operate with 9 volunteers on Mondays. However, we have 23 volunteers which includes pick-up drivers who go to Good Shepherd for the twice monthly and Hannaford. Many of these drivers also help out with unloading the trucks on Good Shepherd Fridays, with packing during the week, and with stocking as needed. A big thank you to all of the volunteers as we could not function without them.

With growth comes the need to stock more food. Bill Glass is on top of that, always looking out for items available for free or for low cost. Good Shepherd has ceased to carry some items, and thus we no longer offer them and some are too costly.

We strive to provide healthy nutritious foods. Thanks to Hannaford we have been able to offer more meat, such as beef, pork, and some pre-made meals. We do our best to provide fresh produce and we order 800 pounds every two weeks. When we get excess items, you may be provided them though you hadn't asked for them.

## THE INCREASE ROBINSON LIBRARY AND NEIGHBORHOOD HOUSE

We will open again the first Tuesday and Thursday in June from 9 AM to Noon. We have copies of *Sumner200* for \$10 and a digital copy, on a thumb drive, of the *Centennial History of Sumner* by Charles Handy for \$6.

In the library, there are special sections focusing on Maine, the Revolutionary and Civil Wars, and books that belonged to the granges. There is an area for children to read and borrow books. We hope to continue the tradition of having school classes come in for a taste of their history.

The genealogy room continues to improve as more family histories are donated. Volunteers are always welcome to help us improve and expand!

In the works—traditional quilting classes at The Wrinkle in Thyme Farm with Deb. Rose will post events and updates on the Buckfield (plus) Community Facebook page.

When the property was left to the residents of Sumner and Hartford by Dr. Lucien Robinson in August 1931, he wrote, in part, "To suffer and permit the said homestead and premises hereby granted to be used as a Community Center for the benefit and use of the residents of Hartford and Sumner, and such other persons as the Trustees may designate, subject to such rules and regulations as the Trustees may prescribe." In the 90 years that it has been in the care of the Trustees (always five as prescribed in his will), every effort has been made to meet and accommodate the needs of the residents, and preserve the history of our rural New England towns.

If you would like to know more about founder Deacon Increase Robinson and his house, histories of Sumner and Hartford, please drop in. You will see at least two of us there.

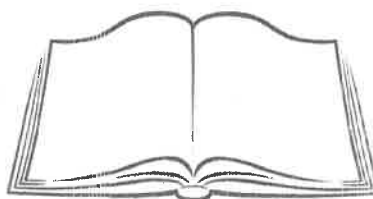
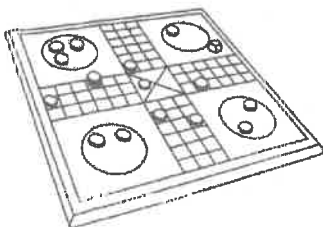

Dear Friends and Neighbors:

Thank you for electing me to serve as your State Senator. The trust you have placed in me to be a voice for you, your family, and our community in Augusta is humbling. As I begin my final year in the Senate, I promise to work tirelessly on your behalf.

The second year of the biennial Legislative Session is statutorily shorter than the first session. Theoretically, we are supposed to be done our work by mid-April but, with more bills than any second session in history – more than 480 bills carried over from the first session and more than 150 second session bills – the legislature will be incredibly busy this year.

My priorities this session will be to lower energy prices, improve the availability of mental health and substance use disorder resources, fix our broken child welfare system, increase the availability and affordability of child care and housing, improve accountability in our welfare system, protect our state's critical infrastructure from foreign adversaries, and develop comprehensive privacy protections of Mainer's personal data.

While many people are still pulling their lives back together from the wind and rain storm last month, I wanted to make sure that those that have been assisting and helping since we were deluged with water and storm damage are recognized for their Samaritan-like acts of compassion for their fellow townspeople.

Ordinary citizens were helping neighbors and strangers. Many opened their homes to house families and pets that were in danger or rising waters or suffering from flooding basements. Some manned generators and sump pumps, or drove people to safety. Landlords opened vacant apartments so those needing shelter had a place to go.



Our first responders and other public employees worked round the clock for days to mitigate the emergencies created by the unusual flooding. Some doing so while their own homes were in danger.
